Hi everyone,

As we begin February I think.....is the worst of winter behind us? I am hopeful that answer is YES, but in the back of my mind I remember that bad weather during the Girls State Basketball Tournament is always likely. So regardless of what the groundhog says this year, when we make it past the tournament (February 26 - March 3) we will see the light at the end of the tunnel.



We continue to move forward with school facilities planning. I know some people think it should go faster and some people think it should go slower. When we started this adventure last summer the plan was to be ready for a bond election by September of 2018. In December, OPN (the Architect/Engineering firm we are working with) began a facility assessment to update the facility assessment we had back in 2012. In January, OPN met with the teaching staff from each building to listen to their feedback and concerns regarding facilities. January 31, at 5pm in the high school auditorium, OPN will be here for a Community Meeting. Their goal is to listen to everyone and understand the feelings and thoughts of the community regarding school facilities. Following the Community Meeting OPN will meet with the School Facility Committee the same night.

**Moving forward...**all of the feedback they collect and the data from the facility assessment will be used to help our School Facility Committee narrow options. When we can narrow our focus on school facilities we will again look to the community for feedback. Once we get a plan that we feel the community can support we will bring it to the school board for approval. If we stay on schedule that should be about the end of the school year. Then we will work hard this summer and fall, to share facts and information about the future of the Monticello Schools facilities. If all goes as planned, we should be on track for an election in September.

**The big picture...**there is no way to sugarcoat the fact that it will cost money to make needed school improvements or build new facilities. We are in a position right now that it will probably be cheaper to build something new. School facilities can not be taken for granted, and they do not last forever. It is our responsibility to leave these school facilities in better condition for the next generation. With costs rising each year and the condition of our buildings getting worse the question is....Why not now? We can not afford to kick the can down the road any longer.

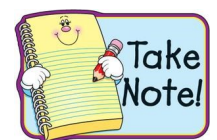

## Little Panthers Preschool

For 2018-19, we will have openings in the Little Panthers Preschool. If you are interested in registering your 4-year-old, please pick up an application from the Shannon Elementary School office in February or go to <http://www.monticello.k12.ia.us> -Shannon Elementary-Little Panther Pre-School

### **Statewide Voluntary Preschool Programming for Four-Year-Old Children**

For 2018-19, we are expecting to receive state funding to support preschool programming for four-year-old children. Here are some Frequently Asked Questions to help community members gain a better understanding of what this preschool funding means to Monticello.

**Which preschools are partners in the MCSD Program?** Little Panthers Preschool (Shannon Elementary), Mother Goose Preschool (St. Matthew Church), and Sacred Heart Preschool (Sacred Heart School)

**How will the funding be used?** There are many assurances (i.e., requirements) that need to be met when using preschool funding. Money will be spent to make sure that these assurances are met. The assurances include (but are not limited to):

- Facility requirements including accessibility and playground guidelines
- Costs associated with teacher and paraprofessional professional development and certifications
- Paying staff costs for required instruction, program operation, home visits, family nights, and parent/teacher conferences
- Supplies and Equipment

**Which children will this funding support?** Funding must be used to support children that turn age four on or before September 15<sup>th</sup>.

**Will my four-year-old receive free preschool?** Little Panthers Preschool is a full day program. The program will be 4 full days with a max tuition of \$135.00. Mother Goose Preschool (M-Th, 8:00 am–11:00 pm) and Sacred Heart Preschool (M-Th, 8 am – 11 am or 12 pm – 3:10 pm) are ½ day programs, and they are free.

**Will my four-year-old receive transportation to and from preschool?** The school district may be able to provide free transportation using an existing bus route. Check with your preschool provider for more information.

#### **Registration?**

All three programs are currently taking applications for the 2018-19 school year. To increase your chances of securing a slot, apply to the programs by February 28<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

## Nathan Oswald Wins the Monticello Middle School National Geographic Bee

*Moves One Step Closer to \$50,000 College Scholarship*

8th grader **Nathan Oswald** won the school-level competition of the National Geographic Bee on January 16, 2018 and a chance at a \$50,000 college scholarship. Nathan will take a test to be submitted for scoring. Up to 100 of the top scorers in each state will be asked to compete in their state bee, which takes place on April 6, 2018. The winner of the state bee will earn a trip to Washington, D.C. for the national championship rounds.

The top ten school finalists to compete included the following students: **5th graders Carson Rickels and River Smith, 6th graders Sienna Hendricks and Kyle Cox, 7th Graders Austin Kurt, Juan Moncada, and Erik Wallerich, and 8th graders Erlin Bell, Elise Kehoe, and Nathan Oswald. Erlin Bell** earned 2<sup>nd</sup> place.

A big thank you goes out to local groups, businesses, and individuals who donated various items so that the finalists would have a small prize. Thank you to **Casey's, The Century House, Citizens State Bank, Dutrac, The Edge, Fidelity Bank, Happy Joes Pizza, Kardes, La Hacienda, Legacy Lanes, Wolken Dental, Above and Beyond, and Labarge Painting.** I would also like to thank **Deb Bowman** for acting as the master of ceremonies for the event.

All 5<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade students at the middle school participated in the preliminary rounds of the bee in their social studies classes to attempt to be finalists.

The National Geographic Society will provide an all-expenses paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state winners to participate in the Bee national championship rounds May 20-23, 2018. The first- place national champion will receive a \$50,000 college scholarship, a lifetime membership in the Society, including a subscription to National Geographic magazine, and an all-expenses-paid Lindblad expedition to the Galápagos Islands aboard the new National Geographic Endeavour II. Travel for the trip is provided by Lindblad Expeditions and National Geographic. Second- and third-place finishers will receive \$25,000 and \$10,000 college scholarships, respectively. National Geographic will air the final round of the National Geographic Bee Championship in May 2018. It will air later on public television stations; check local television listings for dates and times. This year marks the 30th anniversary of the National Geographic Bee. The National Geographic Society developed the National Geographic Bee in 1989 in response to concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. Over three decades, 1,583 state champions have traveled to D.C. to participate in the finals and more than \$1.5 million in college scholarship money has been awarded to winners of the competition by the National Geographic Society. Everyone can test their geography knowledge with the exciting Geo Bee Quiz, an online geography quiz at [www.nationalgeographic.org/bee/study/quiz](http://www.nationalgeographic.org/bee/study/quiz), which poses 10 new questions a day and with the National Geographic Geo Quiz Alexa skill, which releases six new questions a day. In honor of the 30th anniversary of the Bee, National Geographic has also published an updated National Geographic Bee book: "How to Ace the National Geographic Bee: Official Study Guide, 5th Edition," by Stephen Cunha.

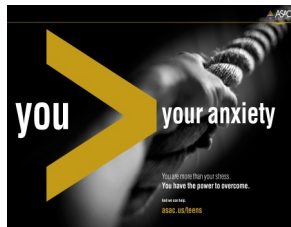
## Open Enrollment Timelines

Parents/guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their child/ren in a public school district in the State of Iowa other than their district of residence should be aware of the following dates: **March 1, 2018**— Last date for regular open enrollment requests for the 2018-19 school year. **September 1, 2018**- Last date for open enrollment request for entering kindergarten students. In order to qualify for open enrollment *after* the March 1st deadline, the student must meet the "good cause" definition for the 2018-19 school year. Good cause relates to: (1) There is a change in district of residence due to: family move, change in marital status, foster care, adoption, or treatment program; (2) Participation in foreign exchange program; (3) Failure of negotiations for reorganization or whole grade sharing; (4) Loss of accreditation or revocation of a private charter school; (5) Pervasive harassment; (6) severe health need (determined by the district). If these circumstances occur after March 1, a parent or guardian may file a "late" open enrollment application. Transportation assistance is available for those who qualify according to income guidelines between contiguous districts. This may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a reimbursement. Parents should be aware that open enrollment may result in the loss of athletic eligibility for students in grades 9-12 for varsity competitions for the first 90 school days of transfer. Children will remain on open enrollment status unless the parent/guardian decides to cancel it or the agreement is terminated as a result of the parent/guardian moving, by not sending the child to the requested district or any other circumstance that results in the pupil no longer attending the receiving district. ## “You Are More” Campaign helps empower teens to overcome adversity.

The Area Substance Abuse Council, in partnership with the Jones County Safe & Healthy Youth Coalition and local teens, began kicking off the “You Are More” campaign. During local focus groups, teens report turning to substances to deal with things such as stress, anxiety, and depression. This campaign focuses on empowering youth to know they can reach out for help if they are feeling overwhelmed by the stresses of being a teenager.

The campaign consists of three main messages that help encourage teens to overcome these very issues with a focus on resiliency skills and seeking help. During focus groups with youth, it was identified that along with using social media, youth also turned to the internet to find guidance but were struggling with the abundance of information not completely focused at youth their age. From these conversations a teen webpage was developed that includes topics that teens felt are most relevant with what they are dealing with, as well as a place where teens can share personal stories about overcoming adversity and receiving support from our community members.
