Hi everyone,

It is May!!! On Sunday, May 28th at 2pm we will be celebrating the graduation of 68 seniors in the Class of 2017!!! We still have a lot to get done before then and I am sure if you have a student graduating you also have a lot to get done before Graduation Day. The time will go fast as it always does in the spring.

In the spirit of Graduation I wanted to focus this article on our high school students. You may have noticed that your elementary students will grow into high school students as time goes by. I think we can all agree that there are many developmental differences between elementary students and high school students. One thing that can sneak up on parents is the amount of sleep a high school student gets each night. The child that used to be sound asleep by 8pm



has evolved into a teenager that is wide awake at 8pm...9pm...10pm...11pm...and even later. Then in the morning they have a very difficult time waking up for the school day. According to a 2011 sleep poll, by the time students reach their senior year, they are sleeping an average of 6.9 hours a night, down from an average of 8.4 hours in the sixth grade.

How much sleep does a teenager really need? The research shows that 9.25 hours of sleep is optimal but unfortunately only 8% of all teenagers get that much sleep. For teenagers, social and cultural factors have collided with the biology of adolescence to create sleep deprivation. Then the problem is compounded when many adolescents try to make up for lost sleep on the weekends, sometimes sleeping upwards of 12 hours on Friday and Saturday nights, which only further disrupts their sleep cycle. So they are tired....why is this so important? Research out of Stanford University shows that sleep deprivation increases the likelihood teens will suffer negative consequences, including an inability to concentrate, poor grades, drowsy-driving incidents, anxiety, depression, thoughts of suicide and even suicide attempts.

For many high school students social media such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Tumblr, and YouTube are distractions that keep teens up later. Research has shown that the light coming off electronic devices late at night keeps teens awake. Not to mention that teens have busy schedules. They have homework, sports/music activities, church activities, babysitting, and jobs that take up after school time. The fact is that all of these things are normal for teens these days and when teens are asked what they can give up to get more sleep they usually reply that they would rather not give up anything and they can live with less sleep.

What can be done? Studies suggest adolescents do better in terms of mood and fatigue levels if parents set the bedtime and choose a time that is realistic for the child's needs. Growing teens still benefit from someone who will help set the structure in their lives. Teens are still not good at making decisions...especially when it comes to bedtime. Research show, in families where parents set the time for sleep, teens are happier and better-rested. Also, if parents teach their teen how to budget their time it can pay off in extra sleep. Finally, set a time at night where the technology is off or at least the social media is off. Interactions on social media are distracting and do not allow teens to fall asleep. Draw your line in the sand and do not allow them to cross it. Sure teens do not like boundaries and organization strategies, but what teen does. In the long run we all want our teens to be happier and healthier and if a little guidance and organization can help then I say do it.

Monticello FFA at State Convention

Quinton Fellinger represented the Monticello FFA Chapter as a star finalist in agriculture placement while eight members received their Iowa FFA degrees at the 89th Iowa FFA Leadership Conference held April 9th -11th at Iowa State University.

Fellinger was a star finalist in the area of agriculture placement, placing in the top six out of 656 total members receiving their Iowa FFA degree. He received a plaque with his picture on it and a check for \$100 for his efforts through his Supervised Agriculture Experience program in which he manages two 2480 head hog finishing buildings.

Breanna Adams, Grace Gadient, Cassidy Russell, Quinton Fellinger, Jacob Lorenzen, Kirklen Kiburz, Robert Pejchl, and Wesley Henderson received their Iowa FFA degrees Only 656 members from 220 FFA chapters totaling less than 5% of the state's membership receive this award.

The Monticello FFA Farm Business Management team consisting of Kirklen Kiburz, Avery Martensen, Jacob Manternach, and Wesley Henderson placed 22nd in the state out of 86 teams.

Monticello's FFA Chapter Activity Display that was organized by Marissa Recker, Breanna Adams and Lauren Shady placed in the top 12 out of 97 boards.

Chloe Gray was selected as a flutist and performed with the State FFA Band during several sessions of the conference.




Parents of next year's seniors:

Asbestos Notification —(Annual Notice)

The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act of 1986 (referred to as AHERA) was enacted by Congress to determine the extent of and develop solutions for any problems schools may have with asbestos. This notification, education and training of our employees, plans and procedures to minimize the disturbance of asbestos containing materials, and plans for regular surveillance of the asbestos containing materials are a part of our efforts to meet government regulations. A copy of the asbestos management plan is available for your inspection at the Transportation/Buildings Grounds Office at 708 South Maple Street, Monticello, IA.

Annual Notice-Reporting Child Abuse—(Annual Notice) Policy #403.0

In compliance with state law and to provide protection to victims of child abuse, incidents of alleged child abuse should be reported to the proper authorities. All district employees are encouraged, and employees who constitute mandatory reporters pursuant to state law are required, to report alleged incidents of child abuse that they become aware of within the scope of their professional duties.

When an employee who is a mandatory reporter suspects that a student is the victim of abuse, the employee shall notify the lowa Department of Human Services, orally or in writing. If the employee believes the child is in immediate danger, the local law enforcement agency shall also be notified. Within forty-eight (48) hours of an oral report, the employee shall file a written report with the lowa Department of Human Services.

The district shall arrange for employees who are mandatory reporters to complete a two-hour training course relating to the identification and reporting of child abuse within six months of initial employment, unless the employee submits evidence that he/she has completed the required course within the previous five years. This course must be retaken at least every five years.

It is also the policy of the district that all employees are required to report to the level one investigator any suspected cases of physical or sexual abuse of students by district personnel.
