The Health Risks of Vaping

Across the country the use of e-cigarettes is spiking among youth but parents aren't even sure what they are and teens mistakenly believe there are no serious health risks. The newer devices look like a computer thumb drive or a pen making it difficult for educators to detect them. E-cigarettes don't give off as much smoke as traditional cigarettes and can often be odorless or have a sweet smell. Nicotine is the pri-



mary substance in e-cigarettes. The nicotine cartridge inserted into the e-cigarette gives about 200 puffs, as about much nicotine as a two to three packs of cigarettes. Nicotine raises the blood pressure and spikes adrenaline levels. As a result, it increases the user's heart rate and can lead to a heart attack. A new study found that some common chemicals used to flavor vape juice could be harmful to people's blood vessels. Along with nicotine, the vaping liquids contain additives such as propylene glycol and glycerol. These are toxic chemicals



that have been linked to cancer, respiratory failure, and heart disease. Researchers are only beginning to discover how vaping affects the physical health over long term. Nicotine is highly addictive and releases dopamine in the brain. Research suggests that nicotine may be as addictive as heroin and cocaine, hence, vaping has a high risk of addiction. Parents, healthcare providers, and policymakers need to take action to reverse this harmful trend. **~Dawn Graver, School Resource Officer**

FACTS ON HEAD LICE

What are head lice?

Lots of children get head lice each year. Head lice are small insects that live on the hairy parts of the body. They are very small, about the size of a sesame seed. Lice can be tan, brown or gray. Lice eggs are called nits. They are tiny, white, and oval. Nits attach to the hair near the scalp, mostly behind the ears and at the base of the scalp. Head lice are not a sign of being dirty, are not dangerous, and do not spread disease. The most common symptom is itching, but some children have no symptoms at all.

How are lice spread?

*Lice can't jump, they only crawl. Head to head contact is the most common way to get lice.

*The sharing of clothing (hats, scarfs, coats, sports uniforms) or articles (hair ribbons, barrettes, combs, brushes, towels, stuffed animals) recently worn or used by a person who has head lice.

What can you do to prevent head lice?

*Parents are the key to looking for and treating head lice. The lowa Department of Public Health advises parents to spend 15 minutes each week on each child carefully looking for head lice or nits. Talk to your children about what to avoid and what not to share.

*Avoid head to head (hair to hair) contact during play and other activities at home, school, and elsewhere (sports activities, play-ground, slumber parties, camp).

 $^{\bar{*}}\text{Do}$ not share combs, brushes, or towels. Disinfect combs and brushes by soaking them in hot water (at least 130 degrees F) for 5-10 minutes.

*Do not share hats, scarves, coats, sports uniforms, hair ribbons, brushes, combs, or barrettes.

*Do not lie on beds, cloth furniture, pillows, carpets, or stuffed animals that have been recently used by someone with head lice.

What if you find live head lice or nits ?

The Iowa Department of Public Health recommends a 14-day treatment process. For a brochure talking about treatment recommendations and a treatment calendar detailing what to do each day, please visit:

*Do not fumigant sprays or fogs. They are not necessary to control head lice and can be toxic if inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

*Only ordinary house cleaning, vacuuming, and washing bedding and clothes in hot water and drying on hot/high heat are needed. No special efforts or sprays are needed to clean your home. Only dead or dying lice are found on clothing, bedding or furniture. For stuffed animals and pillows, etc. you cannot wash and dry, seal in plastic bags for two weeks to kill the lice.

*The use of oils, mayonnaise, lotions, creams, and vinegar has not proven effective. Kerosene, gasoline, and similar products do not work and are dangerous.

Monticello Board of Education Corner...

The Board of Education held their monthly work session on November 13, 2018 in the Board room. At the work session the Board heard an update from Director of Technology Curt Tauke & Superintendent Brian Jaeger on our 3 Year Strategic Operating Plan (SOP). We are in the final year



of our 3 year plan and things are going very well.

Mr. Tauke presented on the Technology portion of the plan. He stated that our first ever technology roll out nights that were held in August were very successful. On both nights, parents & students had their Chromebook in hand and were out of the building in 45 minutes. Next year we are hoping to hand out the Chromebooks on either registration day or at open house. Both teachers & students are getting adjusted to having them in their classrooms. Also, letters have been going out to those students that have had repairs or damage to their Chromebooks.

In lieu of Curriculum Director Gretchen Kriegel's absence, Dr. Jaeger presented on the Teaching & Learning portion of the plan. He reviewed the 5 strategies for this part of the plan. One of the highlights is that we are at 100% implementation of Standards Referenced Reporting across the District and will continue to inform and teach students & parents on this new grading system. A *Frequently Asked Questions* (FAQ) document will be added to our website soon.

Dr. Jaeger also updated the Board on the other two parts of the SOP—Facilities and Communication. For facilities, OPN Architects have been busy meeting with the administration and grade level teams and are hoping to have some of the plans finalized to show at our November 26 Board Meeting. They are hoping to have bids sent out in March 2019. A traffic study, soil study, topo test, and well tests have also been started.

For the Communication part of this plan, one of the focus areas is our website. We would like to revamp our website so it is more user friendly for everyone and to add a data dashboard. We will also be reviewing the results from our surveys that were sent out last Spring so we can continue to improve as a District and develop a new 3- or 5-year Strategic Operating Plan.

Attention Parents and Guardians:

Winter is upon us! As we are in the season for cold weather, we would like to remind you that there is no regularly scheduled adult supervision at school buildings before 7:50 AM. (<u>Exception</u>: Students that ride the shuttle buses may be on the school site (as necessary) prior to 7:50 a.m. and middle school students should not arrive before 7:45 a.m., doors open at 7:50 a.m.) Except in rainy or sub-zero conditions, buildings are generally not open before 8:00 AM.

Please be certain your children are properly attired for colder temperatures with a winter coat, hat, and gloves. Elementary students also need snow pants, boots, and weather proof gloves for recess and be sure that the extra clothes you have in your lockers are weather appropriate.

It is also important for bus riders to have proper winter attire. While it has not happened in recent memory, the possibility exists a bus could break down while on a route. As such it is important the children be warmly dressed in case a bus break down occurs.

Finally, especially for elementary and middle school students, please mark your child's name on their coat, gloves, and hat. District employees (especially bus drivers) regularly find lost articles of clothing, and with no name on the clothing we have no way of returning the items to their owner. Thank you!

<u>Fact</u>: Congress passed the Hungry-Free Kids Act in 2010 with bipartisan support to help ensure every child had access to the nutrition they need to grow into healthy adults. One goal of the law was to help reduce America's childhood obesity epidemic and reduce health risks for America's children by helping schools across the country produce balanced meals so children had access to healthy foods during the school day. USDA based the new school meal standards on independent, expert recommendations from the Institute of Medicine to ensure kids are being fed healthy food while they are in school.
