#### Hello everyone,

As of September 23, 2019 we are now entering the fall!!! That means that the harvest, Halloween, and fall colors are just around the corner. As the temperatures begin to cool down, please remind your children to start to wear warmer clothes. Every fall I always notice students standing outside in 40-50 temps with shorts and a t-shirt on. The problem becomes with the change in temps we will also see the number of sick students increase in each building. I can not stress enough the number one way to be successful at school is to be there!!!



There is a lot of current research on attendance and how it relates to student performance in school. Most of the research revolves around students that are, "Chronically Absent" which by definition is being absent 10% of the days in a school year, or the equivalent to just two days a month. Chronic absenteeism in kindergarten can predict lower test scores and retention in later grades, especially if the problem persists for more than a year. Current research also finds that children who are chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade are far less likely to read proficiently at the end of 3rd grade. When students get older chronic absenteeism is also related to a higher dropout rate among students. In general, it makes sense that students who do not miss time from school do not miss important instruction and guided practice. They will do better than students who are absent more. So keep your students healthy and get them to school.

On November 5, 2019, there will be a school board election held to fill two open positions on the Monticello School Board. Two candidates have filed the paperwork to run for the school board this fall. Mr. John Schlarmann is running for a second term and Mrs. Amanda Brenneman is running for her first term. I just want to say thank you to both of our candidates and thank all of our current and past school board members for their time and commitment to making the Monticello Community School District the best that it can be. Through all of their hard work we continue to move our school district forward and live our mission...

## From the High School Counselor's Office

#### **FAFSA** for Seniors in October

If your student is going to college next year, there are some important dates coming up in the near future that you need to be aware of. The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) becomes available on October 1st. This is an important step in the financial aid process that gives students access to federal student loans, grants, and work-study opportunities in college.

To get ready to file the FAFSA, both you, the parent, and your student should set up a Federal Student Aid ID (FSA ID). This is a username and password that you will use to fill out and sign the FAFSA form. Visit fsaid.ed.gov to set up your ID, and don't forget to write it down! You'll use the same FSA ID every year to file the FAFSA. If you have an older student that you've filed the FAFSA for in the past, you may already have an FSA ID. You will use the same ID for each student's FAFSA.

If you have questions about paying for college, or would like free help filing the FAFSA, the lowa College Access Network offers free resources for college planning and financial aid. You can visit their website, www.ICANsucceed.org, to schedule an appointment, or call their toll free number, 877-272-4692 to talk to an advisor. An ICAN Advisor will help families complete the FAFSA at the high school during conferences Tuesday, November 5<sup>th</sup> from 4:00-7:30 pm. Stay on top of the process, and file your FAFSA as soon as possible after October 1st!

#### Why is Attendance at School Important?

Chronic absenteeism is defined as missing 10% of more of the academic year, including excused and unexcused absences. Good school attendance habits start early and have a measurable impact on a student's success throughout his/her school career.

A few facts about attendance:

- Students who are chronically absent can have a harder time learning to read.
- Students can become chronically absent even if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.
- By 6<sup>th</sup> grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9<sup>th</sup> grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8<sup>th</sup> grade test scores.
- Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

What can you do to support your student's attendance?

- Establish good attendance habits early.
- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Make school attendance a priority.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session if possible.
- Communicate with the school.
- If you need help with barriers to attendance, talk to your child's school counselor.

Influenza (also known as flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. Flu is different from a cold, and usually comes on suddenly. Each year flu viruses cause millions of illnesses, hundreds of thousands of hospital stays, and thousands or tens of thousands of deaths in the United States.

#### What parents should know

#### How serious is flu?

While flu illness can vary from mild to severe, children often need medical care because of flu. Children younger than 5 years and children of any age with certain long-term health problems are at high risk of flu complications like pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus and ear infections. Some health problems that are known to make children more vulnerable to flu include asthma, diabetes, and disorders of the brain or nervous system.

#### How does flu spread?

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly by droplets made when someone with flu coughs, sneezes, or talks. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people nearby. A person also can get flu by touching something that has flu virus on it and then touching their mouth, eyes, or nose.

What are flu symptoms? Flu symptoms can include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, feeling tired, and sometimes vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children than adults). Some people with the flu will not have a fever.

#### Protect your child

How can I protect my child from flu? The first and best way to protect against flu is to get a yearly flu vaccine for yourself and your child.

- Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone 6 months and older every year. Flu shots and nasal spray flu vaccines are both options for vaccination
- It is especially important that young children and children with certain long-term health problems get vaccinated.
- Caregivers of children at high risk of flu complications should get a flu vaccine. (Babies younger than 6 months are at high risk for serious flu complications but too young to get a flu vaccine.)
- Pregnant women should get a flu vaccine to protect themselves and their baby from flu. Research shows that flu vaccination protects the baby from flu for several months after birth.
- Flu viruses are constantly changing and so flu vaccines are updated often to protect against the flu viruses that research indicates are most likely to cause illness during the upcoming flu season

#### If your child is sick

**Can my child go to school, day care, or camp if he or she is sick?** No. Your child should stay home to rest and to avoid spreading flu to other children or caregivers.

When can my child go back to school after having flu? Keep your child home from school, day care, or camp for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone. (The fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.) A fever is defined as 100°F (37.8°C)\* or higher.
