Hi everyone,

As we begin the month of November we have so many really good things happening in the Monticello Community School District. In classrooms, our students are engaged in a variety of activities to challenge them. In the last two weeks I have been able to observe the little ones learning letter sounds at the elementary, students building moving vehicles at the middle school, and high school students learning about budgeting and spending habits. Each of those lessons is exciting in different ways and just seeing our students challenged and learning is wonderful.



This week we received some ACT testing data for the 2020-2021 school year. This is the test that shows the potential that a student will be successful in college. The score also really affects a student's ability to get accepted and receive grants and scholarships for college. Our average composite score is calculated by averaging the individual scores from the math, science, english, and reading portions on the test. This year our composite score was 22.79 overall. That is way above the lowa average of 21.6 and even more above the national average of 20.7. WOW! Way to go Panthers! This has been our highest composite score in many years so I am sure that when the scores come out from other schools in our area we will be at the top of the list this school year.

I would also like to say "Great Job!" to all of our fall athletes in football, cross country, and volleyball. We had such great participation in grades 7-12 and I hope that continues into the winter seasons. In addition, our band and chorus students have really shined so well this fall. I think a special thank you should go out to our Marching Band and our Color Guard for a fantastic season! It is always wonderful to see these students performing at the halftime show of a home football game. Just around the corner we will be hosting "Legally Blonde", the musical, and our students have been working very hard to put this performance together. I hope you can make a performance this month. In the next few months we also move into the speech season. Group speech is up next and it will be followed by the individual speech season. If you have never seen one of these contests, I wish you would this year. To see our students perform at such a high level is a very rewarding experience. The performing arts have been, and continue to be, very important in our school district. So thank you to everyone out there who have been strong supporters of the arts in the Monticello Community School District. We always appreciate your support!

Finally, if you or anyone else you know is interested in subbing, and have a license to sub in Iowa, WE NEED YOU! On a daily basis we are having trouble finding subs to cover rooms and so we are asking teachers to continuously cover for one another. As you could imagine, this is very taxing on the staff and the students. If you have an Associate's degree, or 60 semester hours or higher, and complete an approved substitute authorization course, you can be a substitute teacher in the Monticello Community School District. Even if you can only do one day a week it would be a tremendous help to our school district.

Monticello Board of Education Corner... **School Board Election is November 2** Get out & VOTE!

The 2021 School Board Election is set for Tuesday, November 2, 2021. We will have two important items on the ballot for the election. The first ballot item is the school board election. Three seats are up on the Monticello Board of Education. Members are elected to serve fouryear terms. We have three candidates running for school board. They are:

The second ballot item is to update our Revenue Purpose Statement in the Monticello Community School District. This can only be done through voter approval. The Revenue Purpose Statement currently allows the school district to spend the funds raised by the penny sales tax (SAVE) in any way that Iowa law allows. This will expire in 2029. The approval of this measure will not increase taxes, it would renew the current Revenue Purpose Statement language so we can continue to make decisions on spending locally even after 2029.

High School Students Interested in NCAA Sports

Here is a quick overview of the NCAA Eligibility Center process to help guide student-athletes and ensure they are ready for college sports. Students are responsible for maintaining their academics throughout high school. These tips will help keep them on track for meeting academic initial-eligibility standards:

Grade 9

• Students work with their counselor to ensure they take appropriate NCAA core courses.

<u>Grade 10</u>

• Students register with the NCAA Eligibility Center at eligibilitycenter.org.

<u>Grade 11</u>

- Students work with their school counselor to ensure they will graduate on time with the required number of NCAA core courses.
- Students take the ACT or SAT and submit their scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center using code 9999.
- Students ask their counselor to upload their official transcript to the NCAA Eligibility Center at the end of the year. **Grade 12**
- Students complete last NCAA core courses.
- Students take the ACT or SAT again, if necessary, and submit their scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center using code 9999.
- Students should apply to the school of their choosing and confirm they have been accepted.
- Students request final amateurism certification beginning April 1 before enrolling in college in the fall.
- Students ask their counselor to upload their final official transcript with proof of graduation to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

<u>Parents of Seniors</u>...Senior and baby pictures for the yearbook are due **before winter break of senior year**. Plan to take photos over the summer and have one thing crossed off the senior to-do list! A free option is available for a yearbook photo on Halverson's school picture day in the fall also. Guidelines are listed below:

GUIDELINES FOR SENIOR PHOTOS FOR YEARBOOK

- head and shoulders only
- vertical format
- · clothing should conform to school dress code
- no inappropriate poses
- no other people, animals, objects/props in photograph
- no sunglasses
- color or B/W are acceptable
- submit digitally or write name on back if submitting a hard copy.
- must be received by deadline (before winter break of senior year)

fice drive up window. Baby photos are optional but must also be submitted by deadline if you wish one. Copies are preferred to original heirloom photos. Baby pictures not submitted digitally should be labeled on the back with first and last names. Social-Emotional Learning: What is it?

Social-Emotional Learning includes the knowledge, skills, and attitudes for us to be successful humans. In an effort to help our students be successful now and in the future, we have created a district Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) team to guide this work. Last year our SEL professional development focus involved teacher self-care. This year we have been focused on the 5 core competencies of Social-Emotional Learning as identified by the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning. Below are the five competencies and a brief description.



Self-Awareness: understand our own thoughts and feelings and how they affect behavior

Self-Management: manage our thoughts, feelings, and behaviors to achieve our goals

Social Awareness: understand the perspective of and empathize with a variety of people

Relationship Skills: build and maintain healthy relationships

Responsible Decision Making: make caring, productive choices with our behavior
