Hello everyone,

We are now almost a month into the second semester and we are really pushing forward in every classroom. Recently, we have received our school performance profile data that compared our Pre-COVID data to our Post-COVID data. This data was compared to all the other area schools in the Grant Wood Area Education Agency. The Monticello Community School District improved our ratings in 3 of 4 attendance centers. The fourth one only dropped a fraction of a point. All four attendance centers were rated as "commendable" by the state. In addition, our ACT composite scores this year came in at 22.79 which is one of our best averages over the last 10 years. With school closing for the fourth quarter two years ago and school being offered in multiple formats last year, I think these results speak volumes of the resiliency of our students and staff. We should all be very proud of our results and use these results as a platform to build upon going forward.

Spring surveys are just around the corner and we will be sending out surveys to staff, students, and parents very soon. This will be the 5th year of doing these surveys. These surveys are a good chance to hear the voices out there of our stakeholders and to use that information to grow as a district. These survey results are reviewed by the administrative team, the building leader-ship teams, the school board, and the School Improvement Advisory Committee (SIAC) so we get lots of perspectives on the feedback. When you get a survey in your email, please take a few minutes to fill it out and help us to continue to make our school district the best we can be.

Finally, at the middle school and the high school level we have so many extracurricular activities going on over the next two months. We have athletics, speech, concerts, and the school play all scheduled. Please come in and be a part of the action, we would love to see you here supporting our students. If you can't make it, please remember that we have been broadcasting our high school basketball games online and that is a great way to watch and support our students as well. In fact, if you have a family member that lives out of town or has a difficult time being able to make it into games, please let them



know about our broadcast.

Should Everyone Go to College?

As with most things in life, there is more than one path to success. College is not for everyone; however, everyone should consider it as one of their many options. Here are post-secondary options that are presented to high school students:

- <u>College</u>- a broad term for education after high school (CDL, diploma, certificate, Associate's, Bachelor's, Master's, and other professional degrees)
- <u>Apprenticeship</u>- paid to work with benefits while learning job skills
- <u>Job Corps</u>- learn job skills and live for free at two locations in Iowa
- <u>AmeriCorps</u>- national service organization with education stipend for college
- <u>Teach for America</u>- full-time, salaried position with benefits for two years
- <u>Work</u>- enter the workforce after graduation. Some students choose a gap year to save money for college and then attend.
- <u>Military</u>- service can be active duty or reserves; career-long or one or more enlistments

There are benefits to earning a degree after high school. A study by Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce found that Americans with an Associate's (2 year) degree or higher were much less likely to be unemployed. Earning potential tends to be greater with a post-secondary degree. Wonder what is best for your child or how to support them? Talk to their school counselor! Little Panthers Preschool

Registration for the Little Panthers Preschool for the 2022-2023 school year will be available January 4 thru February 28, 2022. Please register your four-year-old in one of the following ways:

1. Download and print the forms.

Forms will be located on our website: https://www.monticello.k12.ia.us/. Go to Schools, click on Shannon Elementary, click on Downloads, and then download Little Panthers Preschool Application & Questionnaire. Mail the completed application & questionnaire to Shannon Elementary, 321 W South St. Monticello, IA 52310

2. Complete the application & questionnaire electronically by clicking on the Little Panthers Preschool Application & Questionnaire Link.

The link is located on our website: https://www.monticello.k12.ia.us/. Go to Schools, click on Shannon Elementary, click on Downloads, and then click on Little Panthers Preschool Application & Questionnaire Link.

3. The application & questionnaire can be picked up at Shannon or mailed to you by calling Shannon Elementary Office at 319-465-3000.

General education four-year-old preschool openings are filled through a lottery method. The program includes: breakfast, lunch, milk, and snacks. If your child turns four years old on or before September 15, a Statewide Voluntary Preschool allocation will lower your child's tuition. This program also serves six HeadStart slots and special education students (for both three and four-year-olds).

This preschool is an inclusive, full-day program (Monday through Thursday) for students of all needs. Our program offers: a certified teacher and paraprofessional, large and small group instruction, learning centers, developmentally appropriate schedule and activities, thematic instruction, social skills curriculum, and breakfast, lunch, milk, and snacks.

Open Enrollment Deadlines

Parents/guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their child/ren in a public school district in the State of Iowa other than their district of residence should be aware of the following deadlines:

Date	2022-2023 Deadlines
March 1, 2022	Last day a parent/guardian may apply to open enroll their student in grades 1-12 for the 2022-2023 school year.
March 2, 2022	Applications for students grades 1-12 will be denied unless the parent/ guardian is able to demonstrate good cause*.
September 1, 2022	Last day a parent/guardian may apply to open enroll their incoming kin- dergarten student.
September 1, 2022	Last day a parent/guardian may apply to open enroll their incoming pre- school student who receives special education services requiring spe- cially designed instruction (SDI).
September 2, 2022	Applications for incoming preschool students requiring SDI and kinder- garteners will be denied unless the parent/guardian is able to demon- strate "good cause" under lowa Code section 282.18.

*In order to qualify for open enrollment *after* the March 1 deadline, the student must meet the "good cause" definition for the 2022-23 school year. Good cause relates to: (1) There is a change in district of residence due to: family move, change in marital status, guardianship or custody proceeding, foster care, or adoption; (2) Participation in foreign exchange program; (3) Participation in a substance abuse or mental health treatment program that results in change of residence; (4) Initial placement of preschool student in special education; (5) Failure of negotiations for reorganization or whole grade sharing; (6) Loss of accreditation or revocation of a private or charter school contract; (7) Child's school building is identified in need of significant need for improvement as defined by the Iowa School Performance Profiles or the federal Every Student Succeeds Act for two or more proceeding school years; (8) Pervasive harassment or a severe health condition; (9) A consistent failure to reasonably respond to a student's failure to meet basic academic standards (Note: The State Board of Education will establish rules to implement this provision. If these circumstances occur after March 1, a parent or guardian may file a "late" open enrollment application.

Transportation assistance is available for those who qualify according to income guidelines between contiguous districts. Parents should be aware that open enrollment may result in the loss of athletic eligibility for students in grades 9-12 for varsity competitions for the first 90 school days of transfer (*please see the Dept. of Education for further guidance.*) Children will remain on open enrollment status unless the parent/guardian decides to cancel it or the agreement is terminated as a result of the parent/guardian moving, by not sending the child to the requested district or any other circumstance that results in the pupil no longer attending the receiving district. Tech-Savvy Kids Need Tech-Savvy Adults

Most parents agree that keeping their kids safe is a primary concern. When we think of safety, we may think of "stranger danger" in the early years, or the "rules of the road" in the teen years, but being safe with devices and online activity is something that every parent needs to know. Staying one step ahead of tech-savvy kids can be challenging, but necessary, if we want to keep kids safe. Here are a few tips to consider:

- 1. Talk openly with your child about their online activity. Do you know what they are doing and who they are talking to online?
- 2. Keep screens and devices where you can see them, especially for younger children.
- Know your parental controls and use them. Check out <u>https://www.internetmatters.org/parental-controls/</u> if you need information.
- 4. Know who your children's online friends are. Remind them that some online people aren't who they say they are.
- 5. Use caution with posting and sharing. Establish clear expectations about sharing and help kids understand that once something is posted, it can be difficult or even impossible to take back.
- 6. Keep control of your family's digital footprint. Share only with people you know and trust. Use privacy settings on social media platforms.
- 7. Teach children to keep their location private.
- 8. Keep track of online time.
