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Hello everyone,

I am not sure why but the older I get the faster March, April, and May seem to go every year. We have just completed Parent/Teacher Conferences at each school, Spring Break is in the rearview mirror, we have been reviewing our survey results from students, staff, and parents, we are preparing for the upcoming ISASP testing in April, and we have been working with OPN Architects to plan the new elementary school building.

When is the last day of school this year? The school calendar we use with the state is based on the hours that students attend school. They are required to attend for 1,080 hours during the school year. Each year we build some extra hours into the school calendar so we can navigate some late starts and early dismissals for various weather-related reasons. We have had 4 snow days and 4 two hour delays this school year. The schools have done 12 hours of virtual learning which can wipe out two of the make-up days. In addition, we have some banked hours we did not use this winter and the school board could decide to use some of those hours to forgive the additional snow days. So it is entirely possible that we could still end on May 28th as scheduled. We will know the answer after the board meeting on April 28th and I will communicate that out as quickly as possible when we know the actual end date.

What are these "Tax Cards" we are receiving in the mail? These cards are tax information from the school, the county, and the city. The school tax rate is an estimate as the state has not settled on the money they will give the schools as of the date I am writing this. When we can plug in the state funding to our financial planning for the 2025-2026 school year the tax rate will go down

Why is the ISASP important? For those of you that grew up in lowa you may remember taking the ITBS (lowa Test of Basic Skills) or the ITED (lowa Test of Educational Development) test in the spring every year. These used to be the Gold Standard of tests and they were used in lowa and many other states across the country. Students are now required to take the ISASP (lowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress) each spring and each year it has become harder and harder to motivate kids to TRY THEIR BEST on these tests. These tests are a reflection of our students and our school district and we use the data to guide us on curriculum decisions, instructional strategies, and how we teach each student. So I am asking for your help to stress the importance of TRYING THEIR BEST on each of these tests with your child. If we are required to do these, I would like real results that we can use to make our school district the best that it can be.

Where are we at with our Elementary School Bond project? We have been working very hard with OPN Architects to design a really great school. It is time in the process to collect some costing data from the professionals who do this to see if we are on budget with the size and scope of the project. From our planning process it looks like we are on target but many of the materials that are used in an Elementary School building are going to be affected by escalating tariffs, especially with Canada, where contractors often get wood and metal products. Stay tuned

and I will keep you in the loop as the results from the professional

costing estimators come back in a few weeks.
